

# home activities

## for sight word practice

Play Tic-Tac-Toe with two of your sight words.	Make playing cards for 5 to 10 sight words (2 cards for each word). Make sure the words can not be seen through the back. Follow traditional Memory rules.	Use coins to build your sight words.
Write your words on index cards and use silly voices to practice reading them at flash speed (mouse, monster, baby, whisper voice, etc.)	Hula hoop or jump rope while spelling sight words out loud.	Use a magazine to cut out the word, or find letters to cut out so that you can build the word.
Place words on the floor to make a path to a "treasure." Have your child walk over them, while saying each word out loud, to reach the hidden treasure!	With a ball, call out a sight word. Then spell the sight word as you toss the ball back and forth.	Write sight words on paper and hide the words in one room. Have your child find and read each word for a game of hide and seek. Switch roles to play again.
Spell your sight words with cereal or other small snack foods.	Decorate the sidewalk with your words in chalk. Write them <b>BIG</b> and small.	Using your finger on your child's back, write a sight word. Have them pick which sight word you wrote. Try using a list to help with choices.
Create playing cards (2 cards for each word). Make sure the words can not be seen through the back. Follow traditional Go Fish rules.	Paint your words outside using water and a paintbrush.	Get a little messy by pouring flour on the counter/in a pan or using shaving cream on the shower walls before bath time to write your words.
Build the words with Play-Doh or write them in watercolor paints.	Have a parent help you prepare an email to your teacher. In your email type sight words in fun fonts. Try to put them in sentences.	Look for sight words in newspapers and highlight them! OR use a favorite bedtime story to point to sight words.
Challenge yourself to see how many times you can write one sight word in one minute. Can you beat your first try with a different sight word?	Call out a sight word and have your child build the sight word using magnetic alphabet letters on the fridge.	<b>Use sidewalk chalk, or your kitchen tiles and index cards, to make a hopscotch game with a word in each box.</b>
Visit YouTube and type in "Sight Word _____ Song" to watch videos that pop up.	Write the sight words in pencil and then trace over the letters with different color crayons/markers.	Tape words all over a wall. Call out a word and have your child fire a nerf dart at the correct word or use a flashlight to shine on the correct word in a dark room.
